Course Summary:	<p>The aim of the course is to provide theoretical knowledge in policy analysis by examining the most relevant policy theories and theoretical approaches used in government policy analysis. Policy analysis is a course in which the policy making process and its stakeholders are analysed. At the lectures will be approached how certain issues shall be structured as problems, how these issues become important for public, how alternatives are chosen and get on political agenda, how specific policies are chosen and how they are implemented. Namely, policy formulation, implementation and evaluation are analysed.</p>				
	<p>The course can be divided into theoretical and empirical part. In the theoretical part, students are given lectures, seminars and case studies. In parallel, students write their individual work topics within the particular theme from the lectures, make changes as necessary, and apply the theory appropriate for their case analysis. The development of individual work is a process that is in line with the topics discussed in the course on the stages of policy development and implementation, the decision-making process and argumentation (application of theoretical approaches, models and empirical practices, testing).</p>				
	<p>The empirical part of the course is oriented to the acquisition of practical skills in the analysis of Latvian public policy. The insight will be based on two main perspectives: 1) the process of designing these policies 2) methods for assessing policy choices and public policies themselves. Analysis of the policy-making process - to understand the logic of government action, as well as the constraints that affect policy effectiveness.</p>
